- “A portfolio is a purposeful collection of a student’s work that tells a story of effort, progress, or achievement.”
- “A collection of student work that demonstrates achievement or improvement.”

(Stiggins 1994)

- So, it is a;

- ✓ purposeful and systematic process

- ✓ collection of student work

- ✓ attainment of learning target

- ✓ predetermined criteria for scoring

- ✓ student self reflection on what has been accomplished

- ✓ specific & predetermined guidelines for selection of materials



Characteristics of Portfolio

- Clearly defined purpose and learning targets.
- Systematic & organized collection of students products.
- Pre-established guidelines for what will be included.
- Progress documented with specific products.
- Clear and appropriate criteria for evaluating students products.

DEVELOPING A STUDENT PORTFOLIO



1. **Set a purpose for the portfolio;**

- ✓ To show student growth
- ✓ To identify specific skills
- ✓ To quickly show students achievement
- ✓ To evaluate own teaching methods for teacher

2. **Decide how will you grade it;**

- ✓ Use a rubric
- ✓ Use letter grade
- ✓ Use a rating scale

e.g. (4= Meets all expectations; 3= Meets most expectations; 2= Meets some expectations; 1= Meets no expectations)

3. What will be included in it;

- ✓ Specific pieces that students are required to know
- ✓ Common core learning standards
- ✓ The task on which student is currently working on
- ✓ The best work students produce
- ✓ Create a portfolio for one unit
- ✓ Long-term project & include various pieces throughout the year
- ✓ Short-term projects

4. How much will you involve the students;

- ✓ Creating a Portfolio depends upon the students age
- ✓ Older students should be given a checklist of what is expected, & how it will be graded

- ✓ Younger students may not understand the grading scale so you can give them the option of what will be included in their portfolio
- ✓ Ask them questions such as, why did you choose this particular piece? & does it represent your best work?
- ✓ Involving students in the portfolio process will encourage them to reflect on their work.

5. Will you use a digital portfolio;

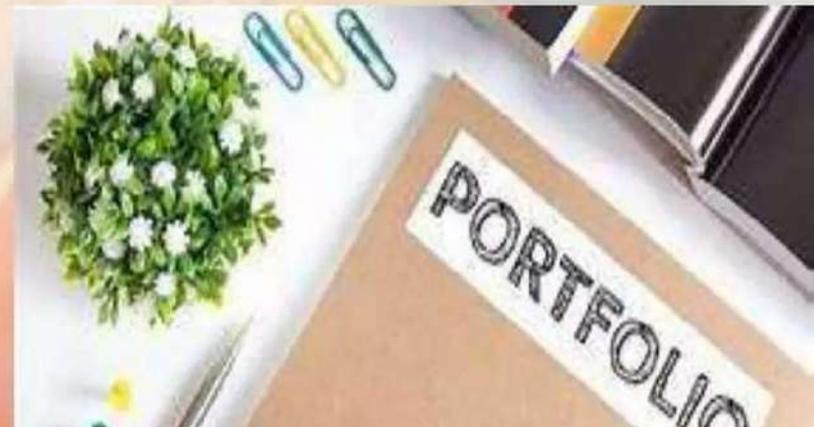
- ✓ With the fast-paced world of technology, paper portfolio may become a thing of the past

Purposes of Portfolio Assessment

- Monitor student progress (**formative**)
- Assess student achievement (**summative**)
- Determine students' grades (**summative**)

Types of Portfolio

- Development/ Growth Portfolio
- Showcase Portfolio
- Working Portfolio
- Class Portfolio
- Evaluation Portfolio



Explanation of types of Portfolio

i. Developmental Portfolio:

- Prior performance is compared to present performance whether development or improvement is going on or not.
- It is prepared by both teachers & student.

ii. Showcase Portfolio:

- It is include students' best works.
- It is important for students to select own works and to reflect their works.

iii. Working Portfolio:

- The ongoing, systematic collection of student work samples & exhibits can be maintained in a working portfolio.
- The collection of daily, weekly monthly, or unit work products.

iv. The Class Portfolio:

- Contains student's grade, teacher's view & knowledge about students in the classroom.
- This portfolio can be defined a classroom portfolio.

v. Evaluation Portfolio:

- It includes a standardized collection of students' work & could be determined by the teacher or, in some cases, by the student.
- This portfolio is suitable for grading students.
