Gender stereotypes in mass media & Gender roles in mass media



Stereotypical Portrayals of Women

- **Gender roles:** Culturally and socially constructed norms dictating appropriate behaviours and attributes for men and women. Media heavily influences societal perceptions of gender roles.
- **Common Stereotypes:** Women as passive, emotional, dependent, and focused on appearance.
- Examples of characters and advertising campaigns reinforcing these stereotypes.
- **Impact on Society:** Discuss how these portrayals affect women's self-image, career aspirations, and societal expectations.

Stereotypical Portrayals of Men

• Common Stereotypes:

- Men as aggressive, stoic, dominant, and career-focused.
- Examples from action movies, sports advertising, and TV dramas.

Media That Challenges Gender Stereotypes

The Impact of Gender Stereotypes

Psychological Effects:

• Impact on self-esteem, body image, mental health.

Behavioral Effects:

• Influence on career choices, personal relationships.

Societal Effects:

• Perpetuation of gender inequality, limited social roles.



Representation of Women & Men in Media

Representation of Women in Media

Underrepresentation and Misrepresentation:

- Women are underrepresented in key roles.
- Limited and stereotypical roles.

The Male Gaze:

Media representations from a male perspective, objectifying women.

Representation of Men in Media

Toxic Masculinity:

- Media promotes harmful aspects of masculinity (aggression, emotional suppression).
- Examples: Hyper-masculine characters in action films.

Positive Representations:

- Media showing men in nurturing, emotional roles.
- Examples: Sensitive male characters in family dramas.



Media Challenging Gender Roles

Positive Examples:

- Shows, movies, ads that break traditional gender stereotypes.
- Examples: Strong female leads, nurturing male characters.

Impact:

Promotes gender equality, broadens societal norms.



Social Media and Gender Roles

Influence of Social Media:

- Both reinforces and challenges stereotypes.
- Examples: Influencers promoting body positivity, gender equality.

Empowerment and Backlash:

- Social media as a tool for empowerment and activism.
- Examples of campaigns like #MeToo, body positivity movements.



The Role of Media Literacy

Importance of Media Literacy:

- Critical for understanding and challenging media portrayals.
- Encourages informed consumption of media.

Teaching Strategies:

Understanding Gender Identity and Roles

- **Definition of Gender Identity:** A personal conception of oneself as male, female, a blend of both, or neither.
- **Definition of Gender Roles:** Societal norms dictating the types of behaviors considered acceptable based on one's perceived or assigned gender.

Historical Perspectives

- Traditional Gender Roles: Typically binary, male as providers and female as caretakers.
- **Historical Shifts:** Changes in gender roles over time due to social, economic, and political influences.

• Examples: Women's suffrage movement, changes in workforce dynamics during WWII, etc.

Societal Influences on Gender Roles

- Media and Representation: Impact of television, films, and advertisements.
- **Cultural Norms:** Variations across different cultures and societies.

• Education and Socialization: Gender roles taught in schools and homes.



The Impact of Gender Roles

- On Individuals: Mental health, career choices, personal relationships.
- On Society: Gender pay gap, leadership representation, societal norms and expectations.
- **Examples:** Effects of toxic masculinity, challenges faced by women in STEM, etc.

Embracing Positive Body Image and Self-Concept

- **Definition of Body Image:** The perception and attitude an individual has towards their physical appearance.
- **Definition of Self-Concept:** The idea and understanding one has of oneself, including aspects such as self-esteem, self-worth, and self-identity.



Importance of Positive Body Image

- Mental Health: Reduced risk of depression, anxiety, and eating disorders.
- Physical Health: Encourages healthy behaviors and selfcare.
- Overall Well-Being: Enhanced self-esteem and life satisfaction.



Factors Influencing Body Image

- Media and Advertising: The impact of idealized body standards.
- Cultural and Societal Norms: Varying ideals across different cultures.
- Personal Relationships: Family, friends, and peers' influence.



Developing a Positive Body Image

- Self-Acceptance: Embracing one's unique features.
- Healthy Lifestyle: Balanced diet, regular exercise, and adequate rest.
- Media Literacy: Critical thinking about media portrayals.



Positive Self-Concept and Its Benefits

- Self-Esteem: Confidence in one's abilities and worth.
- Resilience: Ability to cope with challenges and setbacks.
- Motivation: Greater drive to achieve goals and pursue passions.



Building a Positive Self-Concept

- Self-Reflection: Understanding personal values and strengths.
- Goal Setting: Establishing and achieving realistic goals.
- Positive Affirmations: Reinforcing positive thoughts and beliefs about oneself.



Strategies for Maintaining Positive Body and Self-Image

- Mindfulness and Self-Care: Practices like meditation, yoga, and journaling.
- Support Systems: Seeking support from friends, family, and professionals.
- Avoiding Comparisons: Focusing on one's own journey and progress.



Gender in media: Magazines, TV shows, Cartoons, Movies and Advertisements



Gender in Magazines

- Women's Magazines: Focus on beauty, fashion, relationships, and domestic life.
- Men's Magazines: Emphasis on fitness, success, technology, and lifestyle.
- **Stereotypes:** Reinforcement of traditional gender roles and body ideals.

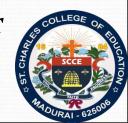


Gender in TV Shows

- **Female Characters:** Often depicted in domestic roles or as secondary characters.
- **Male Characters:** Frequently shown in dominant, career-oriented positions.
- **Changing Trends:** Increasing presence of strong, independent female leads.
- Examples: Comparison of traditional shows vs. modern shows

Gender in Cartoons

- Traditional Cartoons: Stereotypical gender roles, with males as heroes and females as sidekicks or damsels.
- **Modern Cartoons:** More diverse and complex gender representations.
- **Impact on Children:** Influence on children's understanding of gender roles.
- Examples: "Tom and Jerry" vs. "Steven Universe" or "The Legend of Korra".



Gender in Movies

- Hollywood Trends: Male-dominated roles, with women often in supporting roles.
- **Bechdel Test:** A measure of gender representation in movies.
- **Recent Changes:** Rise of female-led films and diverse gender portrayals.
- Examples: Comparison of films like "James Bond" series vs. "Wonder Woman" or "Black Panther".

Gender in Advertisements

- **Historical Context:** Traditional gender roles heavily reinforced.
- **Modern Advertising:** Shift towards more inclusive and diverse representations.
- **Persuasive Techniques:** Use of gender norms to sell products.

- Socialization: Media as a powerful tool in shaping gender norms and expectations.
- Self-Perception: Influence on individuals' body image and self-esteem.

- Examples: Studies and statistics on media influence.

Gender Equality and Language Use



The Influence of Language

- **Definition:** Language as a tool for communication and a reflection of cultural values.
- **Impact:** How language can perpetuate or challenge gender stereotypes and biases.
- **Examples:** Common phrases, idioms, and expressions that reinforce gender roles.



Gender-Biased Language

- **Gendered Nouns:** Use of male-gendered terms as the default (e.g., "mankind," "chairman").
- Stereotypical Adjectives: Describing women and men differently based on stereotypes (e.g., "bossy" vs. "assertive").
- Titles and Honorifics: Differences in addressing men and women (e.g., "Mr." vs. "Miss/Mrs./Ms.").



Embracing Gender-Neutral Language

- Importance: Promoting equality and inclusion through language.
- **Techniques:** Using gender-neutral terms and avoiding unnecessary gender markers.
- Examples: "Humankind" instead of "mankind," "chairperson" instead of "chairman," "they/them" pronouns.
- Benefits: Reducing bias and fostering an inclusive environment A. VAIYADURAI, PRINCIPAL, SCCE



Language in the Workplace

- Promoting Gender Equality in Professional Settings
 - Job Titles: Ensuring titles are gender-neutral (e.g., "firefighter" vs. "fireman").
 - Recruitment Materials: Using inclusive language in job descriptions and advertisements.
 - Policies and Training: Implementing guidelines and training programs to promote gender-neutral language.



Language in Education

- Gender Equality in Educational Contexts
 - **Curriculum Content:** Ensuring textbooks and materials use inclusive language.
 - Classroom Interaction: Encouraging teachers to use gender-neutral language and address all students equally.
 - **Student Awareness:** Teaching students about the importance of language in promoting equality.
